Windmill Pupils Inspired by Elite Athletes at British Gymnastics' World Class Training Camp by Debbie Cambidge,

An unforgettable day of flips, fun, and future dreams at Lilleshall National Sports Centre

A group of excited pupils from Windmill Primary School had the incredible opportunity to take part in a unique social impact project, hosted by the prestigious British Gymnastics' World Class Training Programme.

Led by Pathway Scientist Mairead Slevin, the project focused on *Mental Health and Wellbeing*, exploring how gymnastics—and sport in general—can play a powerful role in supporting emotional resilience and confidence in young people.

As part of this inspiring initiative, the children travelled to the world-renowned Lilleshall National Sports Centre in Shropshire, where they were warmly welcomed by members of the British Trampoline Gymnastics Team. The awe and excitement were palpable as the elite athletes treated the group to a thrilling display of flips, twists, and gravity-defying trampoline tricks.



After a lively Q&A session and a lunch that was a hit with all the pupils, the children were invited to join in the fun. Following a full warm-up, they were guided by the gymnasts through a series of trampoline skills—many trying out moves they'd never imagined possible!

"The day was amazing—we learned loads of new tricks and we can do so many jumps now!" said one enthusiastic pupil. Another added, "When I grow up, I want to be a British athlete... maybe on the trampoline, or maybe in something else!" Of course, the delicious lunch also got a glowing review.

This experience went far beyond learning physical skills. It was about building self-

belief, connecting with inspiring role models, and seeing firsthand how sport can boost wellbeing. We're incredibly grateful to British Gymnastics for making this possible.

With smiles all around and imaginations fired up, it's safe to say the visit left a lasting impression—and perhaps even sparked a few Olympic dreams.





Robots, Coding & Creativity: Chadsmead Pupils Dive into STEM!

On Friday 19th September, pupils in Years 4, 5, and 6 at Chadsmead Primary School were treated to an exciting surprise—a hands-on robotics workshop delivered by Adam from Hyett Education, fully funded and packed with STEM learning.

Over two and a half hours, the children became engineers, coders, and problem-solvers. They began by building robots using diagrammatic instructions, adding working headlights and even designing secure seating systems for Lego passengers. But the real magic happened when they turned their creations into rescue robots!

Each team designed and built Lego hospitals, then programmed their robots to locate and transport Lego characters in need of medical attention. Using coding, maths, and teamwork, pupils tackled a series of evolving challenges that required them to adapt their designs and think critically.

The workshop was a brilliant blend of creativity, collaboration, and computational thinking—and the smiles on the children's faces said it all. It was a fantastic example of how STEM can spark curiosity and confidence in young learners.

Chadsmead's robotics day was a huge success—and a great reminder of the power of surprise, innovation, and hands-on learning.

It's a subject that sparks curiosity, creativity and critical thinking in our pupils, and seeing their excitement and questions every day is what drives our science lessons. Our recent Ofsted science deep dive was a fantastic opportunity to showcase the curriculum we have carefully built and the effective teaching that happens across every class.

Polesworth's Noble Nine Triumph at KMAT Grand Debate!

Our outstanding debating team lead us to success at the KMAT Grand Debate, hosted by Kenilworth School. Nine students from Year 9 were specially selected for their skills in research and debating. Our team had two weeks to prepare detailed arguments for 5 potential topics. The qualifying round saw our four speakers, Rory White, Ellie Celella, Katelyn Woodward and Ella Tipple

going 1v1 with debaters from 19 other schools. We qualified in 8th place with a total of 23 points from a possible 48. Rory and Ellie were awarded 'stand-out' debaters for this round.

The Grand Final stepped things up a gear, with our team having ten days to prepare for ten potential topics! Our students met regularly at lunch and afterschool to research and practice their debates, you could really start to see the fire of success burning behind their eyes. All four of our speakers debated valiantly in the knockout rounds, Ellie and Ella were awarded 'stand-out' debaters for the Grand Final. Ella Tipple successfully got through to the Round of 16, the Quater-Finals AND the Semi-Finals, eventually being knocked out by Kenilworth School... We are thoroughly impressed with her performance.

I am immensely proud of our noble nine, they have done me proud, Polesworth proud and most importantly themselves proud. I could not have asked any more of them, they gave it their all and have come home champions in their own right!



Wilnecote Students Return Transformed After Kenya Expedition: 'Life Skills Gained Are Vital' by Carl Savage,

A team of determined students from The Wilnecote School has returned from a monthlong humanitarian expedition to Kenya, calling it a "once-in-a-lifetime adventure" that

reshaped their view of the world.

Partnering with Camp International, the students worked across four diverse environments—from the Rift Valley highlands to the Indian Ocean coast—engaging in community, conservation, and construction projects. Split into three teams (Lions, Elephants, and Rhinos), they tackled tasks like painting schools, building a mud house, and supporting local wildlife efforts.

Oscar reflected on the experience: "The friends, memories and skills gained were worth far more than any number of pounds or Kenyan shillings." Daisy added, "Seeing the progress of every project was one of the most rewarding moments of my life."



The trip also offered deep cultural immersion, including meeting the Maasai tribe, learning Swahili, and going on safari. Students adapted to local food and basic living conditions, embracing every challenge with enthusiasm.

Despite the hard work, there was plenty of fun—beach days, swimming, card games, and even a football match (with a memorable own goal from Mr. McDonald!). The journey ended with heartfelt letter exchanges and lasting friendships.

Oscar encouraged future participation: "Life skills like communication, dedication and global awareness make the world better." Daisy agreed: "It changed how I see the world—and I'll carry it with me forever."

Our Network Groups... This issue shines a light on our Leadership and Coaching Specialist Network Group led by Deputy Headteacher at The Polesworth School, Caroline O'Regan.

From Insight to Impact: Coaching Champions Drive Professional Growth

This year, the Leadership and Coaching Specialist Network Group is focusing on the continued development of the *Growing Great People (GGP)* initiative, with a strong emphasis on building coaching skills across the Trust.

In collaboration with Rebecca Raybould, CUREE Associate and expert leadership coach, a team of Coaching Champions has been established to lead this work.

The initiative launched with a dedicated training day at Dordon Primary School in July,



bringing together twenty-eight colleagues from across the Trust. The session focused on building a shared understanding of the Coaching Champion role, exploring key definitions of coaching, and refining essential coaching skills. Participants also engaged with practical tools designed to enhance their effectiveness as both coaches and professional learners.

Reflections from a Coaching Champion

"The Coaching Champions training day was an incredibly valuable experience that supported us in developing our coaching skills and equipping us to play a key role in embedding the Growing Great People initiative across our schools.

The training provided us with the tools and confidence to support colleagues in their professional growth, using coaching to unlock potential and encourage reflective practice. The day was practical, thought-provoking, and energising – setting a strong foundation for the positive changes we hope to see within our settings.

One of the most rewarding aspects was the opportunity to connect with colleagues from across the wider Trust. Bringing together staff from different schools and departments created a real sense of shared purpose, and it was inspiring to see such broad commitment to professional development. These new relationships will be key as we continue to embed GGP, enabling collaboration and mutual support in our coaching journeys.

A particularly insightful element of the training was observing real-time modelling of coaching conversations. Seeing the theory brought to life helped us understand what effective coaching looks and feels like in practice. It also clarified the distinction between mentoring and coaching – recognising that coaching facilitates self-discovery and growth rather than providing direct solutions. This shift in mindset has encouraged us to listen deeply and ask powerful, reflective questions.

We left the training feeling inspired and excited – not only about the future of Growing Great People, but also about our own development as Coaching Champions. The day has sparked genuine enthusiasm for coaching and given us a clear direction for how we can positively impact our schools through meaningful, growth-focused conversations." – Rhi Goodeve, Coaching Champion at The Polesworth School

The collaboration of this group continues through Specialist Network meetings, where coaching skills are further developed alongside the evolving role of the Coaching Champion within our schools. Coaching Champions will also be able to conduct further collaborative and developmental work across the Trust to achieve **CUREE accreditation**.

I am very much looking forward to the year ahead and to working with this dedicated group of Coaching Champions as we continue to strengthen the *Growing Great People* initiative – and, through it, enhance both professional growth and the experiences of the pupils in our care.

For those of you who find yourself using social media and other digital platforms, this article is for you. Written by Carl Savage, he takes you on a journey of discovery into how to make the most of Instagram.

Instagram Content Now Indexed by Google!

For everyone working within our schools, get ready! A significant shift has just occurred in the digital landscape that will profoundly influence how your school is discovered online. Google is now indexing Instagram content, meaning your captions, hashtags, and alt-text - once primarily visible to your followers - are now fair game for Google search. In essence, your school's Instagram grid has become an integral part of your overall Search Engine Optimisation (SEO) footprint.



This presents a tremendous opportunity for schools within the Trust to showcase their vibrant communities and achievements to a much wider audience, but only if you know how to leverage it effectively.

What's Actually Changed?

Historically, Instagram posts largely remained within the app's ecosystem. To genuinely engage with an account's content, you typically needed to be logged in and following them. However, Google's latest update has fundamentally altered this.

Now, public Instagram posts can appear directly in search engine results. Consequently, your school's content could start showing up on Google based on:

- The keywords embedded in your captions.
- The hashtags you utilise.
- The alt-text you've added to your images.
- The engagement and overall context of your content.

This means that whether you're crafting a caption about a Year 5 excursion to the Science Museum or sharing a carousel of images from your latest school fete, your content now has the potential to reach an entirely new audience through search engines.

Why This Matters for Your School

This change will fundamentally redefine our approach to social media. Instagram is no longer just about accumulating likes and comments; it has become a crucial component of your school's organic search strategy.

Here's what this means in practical terms for Community Academies Trust schools:

- Social Meets Search: Your school's Instagram profile now serves as an additional entry point for prospective parents, new staff, or community partners to find you via Google.
- Captions are Your New SEO Copy: Intentional writing is key. Including relevant keywords, clear phrasing, and useful details in your captions can significantly boost your school's online visibility.
- Every Post Becomes a Mini Landing Page: Your school's Instagram content now has an extended shelf life and the potential to reach far beyond your existing follower base, attracting new interest and engagement.

From the pen of the ubiquitous Mary Myatt, who looks at Megan Cox Gurdon's new book on the power of reading aloud.

The miraculous power of reading aloud in the age of distraction These insights come from The Enchanted Hour by Meghan Cox Gurdon.

We know that pupils are being read to less frequently at home. There are many reasons for this and it's never a blame game. However, this means that we need to privilege reading in order to fill some of the gaps.

All pupils benefit from being read aloud to; it's not a luxury! This is what Gurdon found:

- Reading aloud strengthens neural pathways and integrates vision, language, and imagination.
- The Goldilocks Effect: audio is "too cold," video "too hot," but reading aloud is "just right."
- Children read to regularly show stronger attention, persistence, and later academic success.

Track and Field Triumph: Community Academies Trust hosts Athletics Competition at iconic Alexander Stadium

The Community Academies Trust has successfully expanded its sporting calendar, building on the popularity of its football tournaments with a major new athletics event held at the iconic Alexander Stadium in Birmingham, home of the 2022 Commonwealth Games.

The idea for the track and field competition was sparked during a serendipitous moment when organisers passed the impressive venue on the motorway while travelling to

It welcomed 13 teams and an impressive total of 208 student participants from across the Trust's schools, providing a fantastic opportunity for young athletes to compete at a world-class facility.

Event Organiser Lee James, from Grange Park, praised the participants' success on the day. "The atmosphere on the day was electric. Seeing 208 of our students compete with such energy, sportsmanship,

and determination on the same track where Commonwealth champions have stood was genuinely inspiring," said James. Their performances, coupled with the phenomenal support from the student officials, made the day an undeniable triumph for the entire Community Academies Trust."
