## The Wilnecote School welcomes local MP to discuss Safety and inspire Futures



On Monday 28th April, The Wilnecote School had the pleasure of welcoming Tamworth MP Sarah Edwards for a meaningful visit that combined community collaboration with student inspiration.

The visit, which marked the start of the new term, focused on two key priorities: addressing local safety concerns and encouraging students to explore future career pathways. A central topic of discussion was the ongoing issue of traffic congestion and parking on Hockley Road at the end of the school day.

With large numbers of students leaving the site and high volumes of traffic, the area has become a hotspot for congestion and potential safety risks.

The school is actively working to find solutions that will ease these pressures and improve conditions for both students and local residents. Ms Edwards, who has a strong track record in community engagement since her election in October 2023, listened carefully to the concerns raised and committed to raising the issue of irresponsible parking with Staffordshire County Council.

Her support represents a valuable step toward long-term improvements in student safety and neighbourhood wellbeing.

In addition to addressing local issues, Ms Edwards spent time with the school's Student Leadership Team. She offered thoughtful advice and encouragement, sharing insights from her own journey into politics and public service. The students found the session both inspiring and informative, gaining a deeper understanding of leadership and civic responsibility.

"The Wilnecote School is proud to play an active role in putting our students' safety first, as well as supporting our nearby residents and finding ways



to make a positive impact. Having Sarah involved in this will make a huge difference," said Mr Simpson, Assistant Headteacher for Safeguarding & Attendance.

Looking ahead, the school is planning a visit to the Houses of Parliament – an exciting opportunity for students to witness the workings of government firsthand. The trip aims to deepen their understanding of how decisions are made and inspire future aspirations in public service, politics, and leadership.

### Going the Distance: Rhiannon Goodeve and Beth Currall Complete the London Marathon for Charity

Rhiannon's marathon preparation began months ago, training through the dark winter mornings and challenging weather. Her dedication paid off not only in completing the race but also in raising an incredible £1,500 for the Heart of Tamworth charity. ## Wilnecote champions Autism Awareness with student advocate programme



The Wilnecote School is proud to celebrate the successful re-launch of its Autism Advocate Course – a pioneering initiative designed to promote empathy, inclusion, and peer support throughout the school community.

Led by Miss Jones, the course welcomed its first cohort of students from the Junior Leadership Team and School Council. Over a series of weekly sessions, these students developed a deeper understanding of Autism and earned both an **AQA award in Autism Awareness** and personalised certificates presented by Miss Jones and Headteacher Mr Foskett.

Now officially certified, these **Wilnecote Autism Advocates** are ready to make a real difference. They will serve as friendly, approachable points of contact for their peers, offering support, guidance, and a reassuring presence around the school. The course equipped them with the knowledge and empathy needed to help create a more inclusive and understanding environment for all students.

Miss Jones shared her pride in the group's achievements:

"They will all be fantastic Advocates for the school to support students in lessons and around the building. I look forward to rolling out the course to the wider school from September." Mr Herbert, Assistant Headteacher and SENCo, highlighted the strategic importance of the initiative:

"This programme is a powerful testament to Wilnecote School's unwavering commitment to inclusivity. Empowering our own students to be advocates for their peers with Autism not only enriches their personal growth but also cultivates a truly empathetic and supportive school culture."

The impact of the course is already evident in the feedback from students:

- "It has educated me, and I now know how to offer help if needed."
- "I enjoyed learning about a condition I didn't know much about."
- "It will be beneficial if I go into teaching I'll understand why others may need more support."
- "If someone is being mocked for something they need, I'll step in and explain why it's important."
- "If a substitute teacher changes the seating plan, I'll make sure students who need specific seats are supported."

This initiative marks a significant step forward in promoting awareness and inclusion at The Wilnecote School. With plans to expand the programme in the next academic year, the school is setting a powerful example of student-led change and community care.

## The Telford Langley School Staff Take on Three Peaks Challenge in Memory of Beloved Student



Staff at The Telford Langley School are preparing to take on the formidable Three Peaks Challenge this June in a heartfelt tribute to a much-missed student, Joshua Lloyd.

Joshua, who tragically passed away in 2023 at the age of 12, left a lasting impression on everyone who knew him. Described by his family as someone who "brought endless joy and love to all those around him," Joshua's memory continues to inspire the school community.

In his honour, a team of ten dedicated staff members will climb the highest peaks in Scotland, England, and Wales–Ben Nevis, Scafell Pike, and Snowdon–within 24 hours on June 14 and 15.

The challenge is not only a tribute to Joshua's life but also a fundraising effort for two causes close to the school's heart: Asthma + Lung UK and Dawley Youth Club.

Deputy Headteacher Kevin Preece, alongside colleagues Matthew Creed and Oli Freeman, launched the initiative with the support of local dignitaries, including the Mayor of Great Dawley and Malinslee, Councillor Ben Carter. Mr Freeman, who has taught at the school for a decade, shared: *"We are doing this in memory of Joshua, to honour his legacy and raise funds in his name. It's a physical and emotional challenge, but one we're proud to take on."* 

The school has already raised over £1,000 toward its £2,500 goal, with additional fundraising events planned in the lead-up to the challenge.

### 'The youth of today!'

That's what the old folks say...

And who are the old folks? Are we the old folks? Is it us looking back to how children used to be in the good old days? And when were the good old days? Pre-Covid...?



Children are growing up in a world vastly different from the one we knew a generation ago. From early years to sixth form, young people are navigating a landscape shaped by rapid technological change, shifting societal norms, and the lingering effects of global events like the pandemic. Unsurprisingly, their behaviour in schools reflects these changes-and so must our response as educators and school leaders.

In early years settings, we're seeing children arrive with challenging social and emotional starting points. Some may struggle with communication or self-regulation, while others display a level of digital fluency that belies their age. In primary and secondary phases, challenges around attention, resilience, and peer relationships are more pronounced. By sixth form, students are often balancing academic pressures with mental health concerns and uncertainty about the future.

These shifts present significant challenges for school leaders and staff. Behavioural expectations that once felt universal now require more nuanced, compassionate approaches. But while the pressures are real, so too is our power to make a difference.

What matters most is not just what children bring into school-but what we bring to them. Our attitudes, our language, and our mindset shape the culture of our classrooms and corridors. When we approach behaviour with empathy, consistency, and optimism, we create environments where all students can thrive.

Negativity–whether in the staffroom or the classroom–can quickly become a self-fulfilling prophecy. But positivity is contagious. It builds trust, fosters respect, and opens the door to meaningful change. As educators, we must model the behaviors we wish to see, not just manage the ones we don't.

To support a positive approach, I chair the Behaviour Specialist Network Group. Our next termly meeting is on Wednesday 25<sup>th</sup> June, between 3:40pm and 4:40pm on Zoom and, whether you're an experienced leader or new to the profession, your voice and experience are welcome. It's a space to share strategies, celebrate successes, and tackle challenges together.

I don't really doubt that the youth of today will grow up to complain about the youth of tomorrow, just like our predecessors complained about us. All of us have probably said and all of us will probably continue to say the same thing: 'It's the parenting!' Some of us will cope with it by decrying and off-loading, and others will bust a gut trying to invest in the futures of the current batch.

If you're a 'gutbuster', join our group and together let's understand, support and inspire the youth of today!

### Behaviour in Schools 2025: A Wake-Up Call for UK Education

### A recent report by the NASUWT teachers' union has shed light on the growing challenges around pupil behaviour in UK schools – and the findings are both eye-opening and deeply concerning. Based on a survey of over 5,800 teachers, the report reveals that:

- **85%** of teachers experienced verbal abuse or violence from pupils in the past year.
- **40%** reported incidents of physical abuse, including being hit, kicked, or shoved.
- 96% encountered persistent backchat and rudeness.
- 7% faced threats involving weapons, and
- **3%** were actually assaulted with one.

Teachers also reported discriminatory abuse, including racial, homophobic, and ableist language, highlighting the complex and often hostile environments some staff are navigating daily.

The report doesn't just present statistics – it shares the lived experiences of teachers, including one who suffered dislocated ribs and torn muscles from an assault, and another who was stabbed in the leg with a pencil.

The NASUWT identifies several contributing factors:

- **Poor mental health** among pupils.
- Ineffective restorative behaviour programmes.
- Lack of consistent policies to deter unacceptable behaviour.

The union is calling for urgent action from schools, local authorities, and government bodies to address these issues, including better training, clearer policies, and more robust support systems for staff.

This report is a stark reminder that behaviour in schools is not just a classroom management issue – it's a safeguarding, wellbeing, and workforce retention issue.

While consequences and sanctions are a crucial part of our behaviour toolkit, effective behaviour systems also require relationships, restoration, and the ability to create a sense of belonging for every child.

This conference is the beginning of an exciting journey. With Tracey Campbell's expertise, we hope to shape a shared vision for behaviour that aligns with our core principles: excellence, high expectations, and a warm, supportive culture that values every child. It is our ambition that this work will lead to a clear set of nonnegotiables, owned and embraced and ultimately embedded by every school, that reflects our shared commitment to creating the best possible environments for learning and growth for all.

We look forward to welcoming you all and to learning together on June 27<sup>th</sup>, challenging ourselves and continuing to build a consistent, compassionate approach to behaviour across our Trust.

We have chosen Teach First as our ECT provider moving forward; a decision that reflects our commitment to quality and subject-specific development–Teach First is the only provider offering subject knowledge support in the second year, which aligns perfectly with our curriculum network groups.

It is with genuine sadness that we say goodbye to Caroline O'Regan. Caroline has been a pillar of support, wisdom, and calm throughout her time with us. ### Meet Tracey Campbell: Champion for Change in Behaviour Management

Tracey Campbell is a powerhouse in the field of behaviour transformation. As Director and Lead Trainer of *Together Transforming Behaviour Ltd*, she brings unmatched

energy, empathy, and expertise to her work as a Behaviour Management Consultant, Coach, Trainer, Teacher, Speaker, and Author.

Tracey's journey began in the primary classroom, where her vibrant teaching style and natural connection with children quickly set her apart. Her exceptional ability to engage pupils–especially those struggling with behaviour–led to her becoming one of the UK's first Advanced Skills Teachers in Behaviour Management.

But Tracey's story is more than professional accolades. She speaks candidly about her own turbulent school years, marked by multiple exclusions and disruptive behaviour. One moment in particular shaped her future:



"I remember being sent out of class–again–and sitting on the corridor floor, angry and embarrassed. I was convinced no one cared. But then my teacher, Mrs. H, came and sat beside me. She didn't shout. She didn't lecture. She just said, 'Tracey, I see more in you than this.' That moment changed everything. For the first time, I felt seen–not just for my behaviour, but for my potential."

That moment of compassion became the foundation of Tracey's mission: to help educators and parents see beyond the behaviour and connect with the child.

For over a decade, she has worked with thousands of professionals and families, helping them move from frustration to confidence, and from conflict to connection. Her coaching is solution-focused, emotionally intelligent, and deeply rooted in empathy. She doesn't just teach strategies—she transforms mindsets.

Tracey is also the creator of the *Behaviour Basics for Parents* course, which gained national attention in Channel 4's *Mr Drew's School for Boys*. Her powerful work on the show led to appearances on ITV's *This Morning* and BBC Radio 5 Live, where she shared her insights on parenting and behaviour with a wider audience.

Her books-*Will You Be the One?* and *Behaviour Basics for Parents*-are heartfelt calls to action for anyone working with children who challenge the norm. Her message is clear: the children who seem hardest to reach are often the ones who need us the most.

Tracey Campbell is unapologetically passionate, relentlessly hopeful, and a true advocate for children who are too often misunderstood. Her work continues to inspire a new generation of educators and parents to lead with love, consistency, and courage.
