# Introducing....

September 2023 saw us welcome Steph Rowett as the new Headteacher for Heathcote Primary School. Steph tells us about her journey to her first substantive headship.



## Hi, my name is Stephanie Rowett, and I took over the headship at Heathcote Primary in September.

I have been very excited to join CAT for my first substantive headship post, feeling ready to develop a school in my own vision - ensuring that an excellent education is provided for the children that we serve. I have been lucky enough to work alongside many exceptional leaders, teachers, support staff and families who have taught me so much about what makes a great school, a great teacher, and a great leader. I am absolutely determined to ensure that I apply all that I have learned to continue to develop Heathcote into an amazing school.

I started my career in a two-form entry Primary within a MAT, predominantly as an Upper Key Stage 2 teacher. During this time, I realised that strong relationships are absolutely essential for success and took part in action-research projects with Warwick University, developing an understanding of relationship-based practice to provide improved outcomes for children. This inspired me to carry out my Masters in Educational Leadership and Management. I was made Assistant Headteacher responsible for developing curriculum within my school, ensuring it matched the needs of our community and provided an enhanced National Curriculum offer. As part of my role, I was asked to work with colleagues within the wider trust to begin their journey to develop a trust-wide program to support newly adopted schools that required rapid improvement.

Following this, I was Deputy and then Head of School at a large (500 pupils) primary school in Banbury, having been seconded there as part of a 'Trainee Headship Programme'. During my time at this school, my passion for research-based teaching and learning enabled me to develop the school, ensuring that **all** adults in the setting were leaders of learning with very high levels of pedagogical knowledge. I really enjoy providing opportunities for those that I work with to develop their own practice and passions and have done this formally by training to become a Professional Coach and by facilitating NPQ sessions. This has enabled me to hold space for people around me, supporting them to reflect, develop and grow in their role - leading to improved outcomes for all.

Educating the 'whole' child is central to the provision that I intend to create within a school, thinking carefully about the knowledge, skills and experiences that the children within the setting need to be well-rounded, capable and happy individuals. This has meant providing opportunities beyond the National Curriculum and thinking carefully about the context in which the school and our families sit. I have previously been Chair of a multi-agency group called *Safeguarding Children in Banbury* (SCIB). This provided a preventative curriculum based on key issues that were prevalent agendas for partner agencies such as the police and social care - exploitation through County Lines, for example. This also provided me with the opportunity to sit on a Serious Case Review Education Panel, with the view to affect system change and improve outcomes for children.

I am looking forward to taking Heathcote into its next chapter, ensuring that the children and families that we serve get the very best start to their educational journey.

We're well ensconced into the new academic year, and much has been happening.

You should hopefully now be using the CAT Teaching & Learning Toolkit which helps sharpen teaching skills through providing descriptions of the different elements of impactful teaching from good, to high to highest. With thanks to the contribution from our network groups, we are hoping to have a "Playbook" ready to support the toolkit with exemplars and videos. Everything will be found under **IOE Resources on the Home Page** of the IoE website <u>www.thecatinstitute.org</u>. The Toolkit will be on there now, and the Playbook will be on once it's been sufficiently populated. As a reminder all schools have their own log on details.

In the last issue we touched on how successful the pilot running summer standardized assessments for all of our Y5 Maths had been. The value of the results of these assessments has since been recognized and the IoE is now supporting further discussions on how we can make best use of this platform for supporting pupil assessment and reducing staff workload. To this end, we are delighted to announce the appointment of a new Director for Standardised Assessments, Paul Hewitt from the Telford Langley School. Many of you will know Paul as the Lead for the Expert Group on Assessments and will be familiar with his expertise in this area. Paul will be supporting schools in the effective implementation of the assessments. Analysis of the results should highlight any strengths and gaps in learning, identify and support children

with additional needs and deliver evidence of progress and whole school improvement through helping to inform appropriate teaching strategies. We wish Paul well.

And finally, the second network and expert group meetings of this Autumn Term are scheduled for 3.40pm on Wednesday 22 November. We look forward to seeing you there.

### **Network Groups Update by Neil Coleman**

It has been a busy first half term for our Network Groups. We have held our first Network meetings of the school year and shared our key priorities for the next 12 months. A big thank you to all staff who attended one of the network meetings and to Headteachers for prioritising these meetings and supporting this work. In total we had 109 colleagues attend one of the 12 meetings.

This year our curriculum Network Groups will be looking to support the work of the IOE by focusing on producing playbook resources for retrieval practice in their subject area. They will also be looking to create a 1. Page guide to support subject knowledge and linked resources to support teaching and learning.

One of our aims this year is to ensure that we have a Network Group to support each curriculum subject area. In September we successfully appointed two new Network Chairs. Helen Parashar will Chair the Performing Arts Network and Hannah Clarke the Design and Technology Network. Just this week we have also appointed Laura Aston as Art Network Chair and Katherine Davis as Geography Chair. The new Chairs are all looking forward to leading their groups in the next round of Network meetings held on Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> November.

After receiving some feedback at the last Headteachers Strategic forum meeting, we are proposing to make some changes to support staff to be able to attend the meetings. As some of our schools do not finish till 3:30pm, it has been agreed by the IOE to move the start time of the Network and Expert groups meetings back to 3:40 pm.

The exceptions to this are: Office Manager Network which runs from 10:00 - 11:00am. School Business Manager Network which runs from 2:00 - 3:00 pm. Cover Supervisor Network which runs from 3:15 - 4:15 pm.

Headteachers also shared concerns that core subject leaders were not able to attend their Expert and Network meetings as they are held on the same day. From next half term, will be piloting a joint Network and Expert Group for Maths. Laura Scotchmer and Katie Holloway will lead a single Maths group where the Chairs will provide both Primary and Secondary expertise. These meetings will be reviewed over the course of the year, and if successful, this model could be rolled out across other subject areas in the future.
