
The careers fair provided a direct channel for us to interact with the Telford Langley students who were not only extremely polite, but were eager to learn about potential career options.

From Novice to Navigator: My Journey as RE Chair by Sarah Dennis

As the RE chair for our networking group, I wanted to share some updates and reflections on my journey since taking over as the RE lead at Chadsmead, where I work as a HL/TA.

It's been about five years since I stepped into the role, and I'll admit, it was a daunting transition. Teaching RE was uncharted territory for me–I lacked formal qualifications and had never



taught the subject before. However, this unexpected path led me to some incredible opportunities. At an RE conference in Birmingham, I found myself sitting next to Mary Myatt, whose insights on using authentic resources left a lasting impression. Inspired, I began collecting diverse photos, including those depicting how religions adapted during the pandemic. This eventually led me to NATRE (National Association of Teachers of Religious Education), where I discovered there was no local group for Staffordshire RE. So, I took it upon myself to establish one.

Over the years, our RE networking group has grown and evolved. We've delved into topics like Core RE for secondary schools and deepened our understanding of the Big 6 world religions. I've also had the privilege of attending training sessions and symposiums, where I met prominent figures like Richard Kueh and Christine Counsell. Currently, I'm enrolled in a two-year RE leadership course and have been elected to the NATRE exec, starting this spring. My aim is to continue supporting and expanding our networking group, welcoming anyone interested in learning more about RE, regardless of their role. Safer Recruitment Training

Introducing....

Paul Hewitt, Deputy Head at The Telford Langley School, was recently appointed Director of Standardised Assessments for our trust in November. Since joining the trust in 2015, Paul has been Deputy Head at the Telford Langley school and also leads the Expert Group Leader for Assessment. Paul brings with him a wealth of experience around assessment and has developed strong links with GL Assessment.

Thank you for the very warm welcome that I have received from you all since my appointment as Director of Standardised Assessments.

It has been a very busy term, with all secondary schools in the trust delivering a range of standardised assessments for the first time in Y7-Y9 from September 2023. My initial work has focused on developing an agreed schedule for the different assessments in the secondary schools including CAT4, NGRT (New Group Reading Test), NGST (New Group Spelling Test), PTE (Progress Test in English), PTM (Progress Test in Maths), PTS (Progress Test in Science) and PASS (Pupil Attitudes to Self and School). I have been focused on supporting the delivery of these assessments working with key leaders across the trust.

I have also been working with the Primary Assessment Pathfinder Group that has chosen to deliver several standardised assessments across all primary schools in the trust in Y3, Y4 & Y5. They have chosen to complete NGRT, NGST, PTE, PTM and PTS this year and I will be continuing to work with the Pathfinder group and GL Assessment to ensure that all primary schools are able to deliver the agreed assessments fully and are supported at every stage.

For those who may be unfamiliar with me, I serve as the Deputy Headteacher at The Telford Langley School, leading initiatives related to curriculum and assessment. As an Expert Group Lead for Assessment, I've delved into topics such as utilizing the curriculum as a progression model and exploring the principles of formative assessment, drawing insights from Dylan William's work.


My collaboration with the Institute of Education in recent years has provided valuable insights into the benefits of standardized assessments in fostering a common language around assessment and sharing effective approaches. These assessments not only facilitate measuring impact and progress but also uncover unseen barriers to learning, support teacher judgment and workload, and pinpoint necessary interventions. Additionally, the national benchmarks utilized in GL assessments ensure the validity and objectivity of judgments, aiding in identifying untapped potential.

I believe a significant strength of mine is my understanding of how to support schools in using the data from standardised assessments to inform action at all levels. The data collected helps to build a clear picture to help inform effective curriculum sequencing, teaching, and learning as well as targeting intervention. In my school I am involved in delivering all the standardised assessments ensuring that I understand both the strategic and operational demands of delivering the assessments - which I believe can support schools in the Trust significantly.

Assessment is not just a duty but a passion of mine. I'm aligned with the vision and values of Community Academies Trust, striving to equip schools with the tools and support necessary to implement industry-standard assessments effectively and utilize data to drive progress and inform stakeholders. The collaboration with exceptional leaders across the trust has been inspiring, and I look forward to continuing to support schools in utilizing standardized assessments to enhance overall school improvement. These initial months have been immensely rewarding, and I eagerly anticipate continuing this journey of shared expertise and ongoing improvement across all schools within the trust.

I look forward to continuing this work with you all.

World Book Day Competition




The Network Group choose 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in their meeting on Wednesday 6th March and the winners were announced on World Book Day.

In all, there were 300 entries. Congratulations to everyone who took part, your certificate is on its way. The overall winners each received a £30 book token:


1st place: Serena in Y5 at Stratford Primary- The Butterfly Club and Scarlett in Y7 at Polesworth- A Streetcat Named Bob


